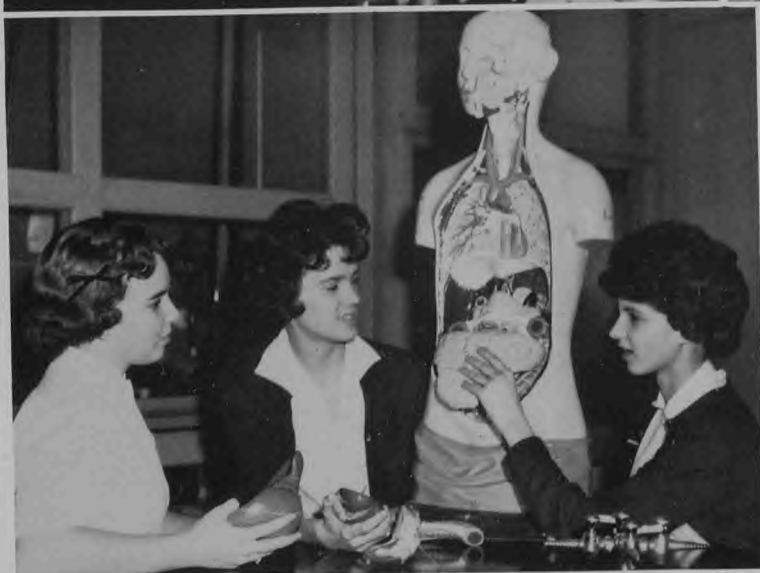

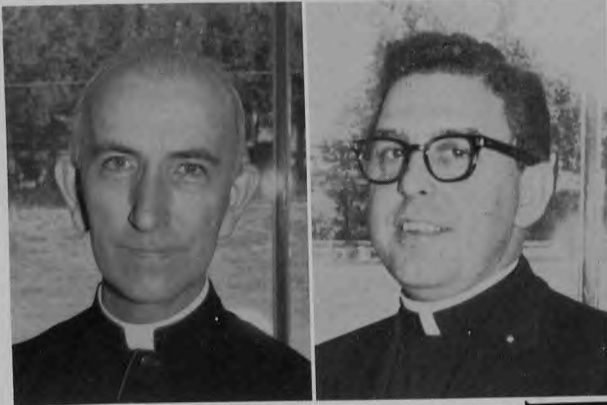
## Religion Strengthens Moral Life

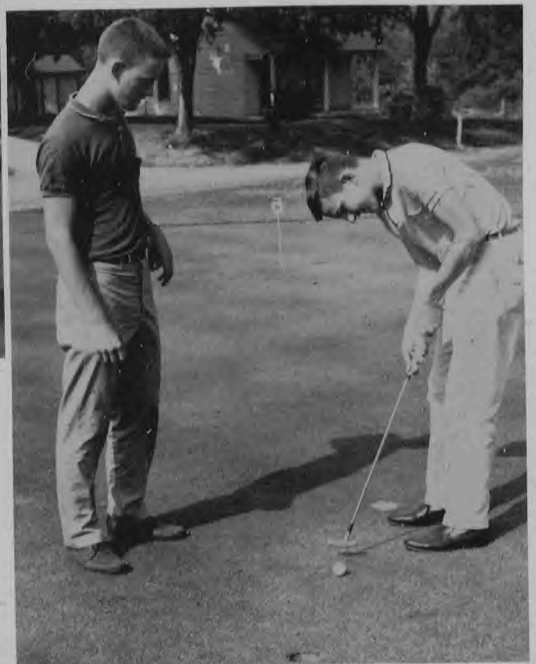

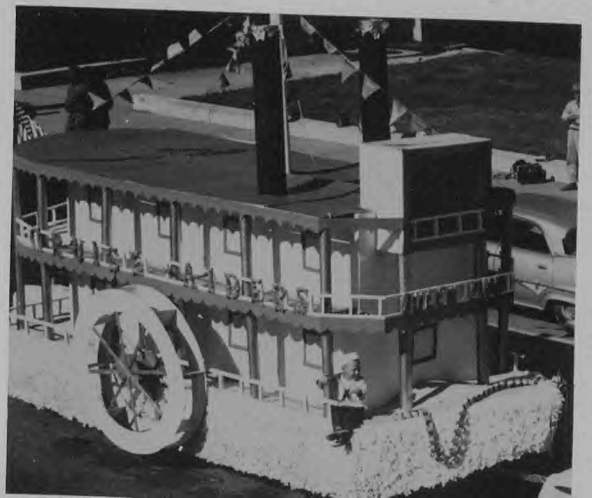
