Capelton and T. Brown, co-captains of the basketball team; S. Richmond, leader of the Majorettes; Ella Nichols, president of the Dramatics Club; Barbara Hardiman, heroine of the Christmas play and member of the Chorus. In addition we are equally proud of having eight Seniors in the Dramatics Club and nine in the School Chorus.

Today as we stand on the threshold of a newer life, looking back over our four years in this Great Land, we are indeed grateful for the knowledge we have gained through all our many and varied experiences.

In June, 1953, as we take off on the transport Plane of Higher Learning for the Land of Greater Wisdom, we shall cherish in our hearts every memory of L. U. Laboratory High as a milestone on our pathway toward our ultimate destination--the Land of Greatest Wisdom--LIFE.




